4. Rich student life: A wide variety of education, sport and cultural opportunities make Bern an attractive place for undergraduates, graduate students, and researchers.



Today, the university has more than 19,000 students, around twelve percent of which are international, from 120 countries. Fifty percent of our staff is international. We provide our students from all disciplines with the very latest international, specialist knowledge and familiarize them with academic methods and thought processes. We also encourage them to undertake their own research as they study in the university's historic buildings and contemporary facilities, most of which are within walking distance of the celebrated city center.

The campus itself provides modern workspaces with excellent infrastructure, and a choice of on-site cafés offers plenty of places to eat and socialize.



Thanks to the highly motivated scientists who teach and research here, the University of Bern is ranked among the top universities worldwide.



Study programs

The University of Bern is a comprehensive university with eight faculties and 180 institutes, offering more than 70 Master's and around 40 Bachelor's programs. There are courses in English at Bachelor's level (e.g., English, Biology, Business Administration, Economics, Social Anthropology, and Computer Sciences), however, the majority of courses in English are offered at Master's level. Most Master's courses are open to Bachelor exchange students.

We also offer the option of making various study combinations. You can even select courses from faculties and institutes outside your own study field (restrictions for Medicine and Veterinary Medicine). Whether you want to combine Economics with Archeology or Psychology with Computer Science, you won't be short of choices.



Language courses

German language courses will enrich vour time in Bern and can be comfortably incorporated into your daily routine, allowing you to communicate more easily with university colleagues and chat more freely with locals.

At the same time, you can take English courses to improve your language abilities to read, write, and study in English at the university.

These opportunities will not only enhance your experience of Bern, but they will also reward you with skills you can take into the future.

German courses cover levels A1 through C2, English courses are from levels B1 through 2, and are in accordance with the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages.

All courses are free of charge.



Study exchange is one of the most exciting opportunities for students. UniBE International ensures that you get the most out of it, even before you arrive. There are **stimulating online events** during which you meet fellow exchange students and acquire lots of valuable information. When vou arrive in Bern for the introduction week itself, there are **lots of** activities to participate in. Clubs and associations

During the semester, the Erasmus Student Network (ESN) Bern organizes a program of various social and cultural activities for exchange students. There are regular excursions to other Swiss cities, hikes in the mountains, international dinners, ski trips, pub crawls, and a visit to a chocolate factory, among others. ESN also offers a 'buddy system' for exchange students.

There are many more clubs and associations at UniBE, e.g., the university choir, university orchestra, and theater club.

The university sports program, Unisport, offers training sessions, courses, competitions, and camps in more than 150 sports disciplines ranging from A (Aerobics) to Z (Zumba), including alpine sports and climbing, fitness, martial arts, running and cycling, dance, and water sports. Most sessions and courses are free of charge for students. There are also two gyms with the latest strength-training and cardio equipment.

Accommodation

There are several student halls of residence in Bern. We will provide you with information on available student accommodation and you can apply for a room online, as well as find opportunities for flatshares with other students.

Bern is a UNESCO world heritage site listed among the cities offering the best quality of life and safety in the world. Maybe that's why its residents are so welcoming and easy-going. Bern's charm is also reflected in the wide range of cultural activities on offer: Its many relaxing green areas, unique shopping arcades, sports possibilities, museums, arts venues, cafés and bars (with its 176 breweries and microbreweries, Bern is considered the 'beer capital' of Switzerland). And if you want to do what the locals do, why not take a daily dip in the Aare river?

Nestled in the stunning Swiss capital is the medieval Old City with its unique sandstone architecture and breathtaking views of the Swiss Alps, which can be easily reached all year round. In fact, most of Switzerland, including the Bernese Oberland, can be explored in day trips.



Switzerland is a unique country of rich, incredibly diverse experiences. It's also right at the heart of Europe making it the perfect springboard for further travels.

Not only are there **four official languages** here in Switzerland — German, French, Italian, and Romansh — the regions themselves are also very distinct. Less than an hour's drive from the impressive signature architecture of Bern are the Jura region and Lake Neuchatel where you will believe that you are in France. In the mountains and meadows of the Bernese Oberland you will find yourself walking from one awe-inspiring picture postcard view to the next. Head further south and you will encounter palm trees and a mediterranean atmosphere.



Talking of walking, did you know that there are 65,000 km of hiking trails to guide you through Switzerland's breathtaking landscapes? Whether hiking and cycling in summer, or skiing, snowboarding, and sledding in winter, the Swiss love to spend their leisure time outside, no matter the time of year. And you won't even need a car: Every lake, mountain, historic city, and tourist destination in Switzerland's 26 cantons is serviced by the welldeveloped public transport system.

Semester dates

Fall Semester: Mid-September through mid-December. **Spring Semester:** Mid-February through end of May.

There is no fixed exam period. Exams often take place after the lecture period.

Language of instruction

German or English (except language departments). Students should have sufficient proficiency in German and/or English to be able to follow courses and write exams (CEFR level B2: CEFR level C1 for courses at the English Department).

Credit system

The University of Bern uses the European Credit Transfer System ECTS. 1 ECTS credit is equivalent to 25-30 hours of work (student workload). A full-time study workload per semester is 30 ECTS. For exchange students a credit load of 20-25 ECTS is recommended.

Application deadlines

30 April for fall semester/academic year. **30 September** for spring semester.

Application steps

- 1. Students must be nominated by their home university.
- 2. Students fill in the online application and submit their application dossier before the deadline.
- **3.** Students receive a notification by UniBE International on the outcome of their application and information regarding further steps.
